Yes. For admission students depend on Students Academic Management System (SAMS). In the library there is a Library management system to access books, issue books, return books, reserve books, student transaction reports, book issue report, book return report and defaulter list. Accounts staff depends on accounts software for fees collection, DCR maintenance, and document management(CAPA) to fulfill their needs. The examination section uses the software (Academia)to manage examination systems on-line starting from students' enrolment to issue of mark-sheets and provisional certificates.

### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

CBCS Course has been implemented. Boards of Studies of different departments are convened every year to update the syllabi. Academic Council ratifies the resolution of the boards.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Maintenance of lesion plan and progress Register is done by the depts. On regular basis Departmental seminars, ICT enabled seminars and inter disciplinary seminars besides regular classes are being held regularly. Lesson Plans and Progress Register are updated in all the departments regularly. Experts are invited for inter face in different departments. Laguage Lab of the college helps in imparting soft skill.

Automation work of library is under progress. There is a Language Laboratory for soft skills development of the students and there are computer labs run under the Department of Physics and Mathematics. A new Computer lab has been established.
